# **Student Association Elections 2012-13**

In the Spring Term each year, we hold elections for the Student Association Committee. The positions are open to any student (subject to the approval of their Personal Tutor) who is in the first year of a two year course. The term of office is one year, from Easter 2012 to Easter 2013. These are significant posts; universities and employers hold in high regard students who have held such offices.



#### Student President and Vice President

Whilst all the posts are important, the most significant positions are those of Student President and Vice President, so ably undertaken this year by Russ Kelaart and Josh McCusker. Both act as important ambassadors for the College and are involved in all its public functions - so public speaking is essential. Both the President and the Vice President are Governors of the College and are expected to attend Governors' meetings.

Thus the roles of President and Vice President present an excellent opportunity to develop leadership skills and to contribute to the corporate governance of a College with an annual income of several million pounds - neither post can be undertaken lightly.

The time commitment is not excessive – but meetings need to take precedence over part-time jobs, and time-management skills need to be sufficiently well developed to manage A-level deadlines.

Other posts are:

Treasurer: monitors the SA funds and keeps up to date accounts.

Communications Officer: organises all meetings, including Student Council; records minutes.

Events Officer: organises and publicises a variety of social and other events.

Charities Officer: organises a variety of fund-raising events including the RAG week.

Publications Editor: leads the editorial team - College Magazine and Year Book.

**Learning Experience Officer:** represents the views of the student body on the development of teaching excellence. Environment Officer: encourages us all to place environmental issues high on the agenda, individually and collectively.

**Sports Officer:** represents the activities of the many sports teams and organises an Inter-Tutor Group Sporting Event in 2012-13.

Performing Arts Officer: represents the activities of the many students engaged in performing arts.

Equality, Diversity and Community Links Officer: encourages and organises community activities by students, in liaison with Chris Eustace, Lead Tutor for Enrichment. Also sits on the Equality and Diversity Committee.



#### Student President Russ Kelaart says:

"Being an SA officer requires a lot of hard work throughout the year although, it is extremely rewarding; regardless of your individual role, as a team we achieve a great deal. If you are dedicated, enthusiastic, good at working closely in a team and are looking to get the most out of College, then a role on the SA could be for you.

Getting elected for the SA is no mean feat, and standing up in front of a rowdy crowd for 3 minutes is an interesting challenge to say the least! As usual, we expect students to accompany parents in order to make the discussion as helpful and fruitful as possible. When you arrive, please go straight to your first appointment. Should you need a map showing where teachers are located, it can be collected from either the main entrance to the College or the rear entrance near to Time Out. Students will be able to make appointments nearer the time on your behalf.

Please note that:

- teachers will be in their normal teaching locations:
- careers advice will be available each evening;
- when making appointments, students should build in plenty of walking time between locations;
- if you wish to see the student's Personal Tutor, it is best to see him or her last:
- teachers do try to keep to time please do not assume that the interview is endless! If you wish to have an extended meeting, this should be arranged
- please note that some part-time teaching staff are unable to be present at both evenings. Students should speak with their Subject Tutor to check whether this is the case. In the event that they are not in on the evening most convenient for you, other arrangements such as an alternative meeting with the teacher or a telephone consultation can be made.

### Second Year Students in need of help

The above Parents' Evenings will also be available to parents of second year students who are experiencing difficulty. If you have concerns, please ask your son or daughter to make appointments with his or her teachers.

#### **Review Data**

AS students and students on one year courses have just completed a January Subject Review, involving discussions on progress with each of their teachers. Current data concerning students' progress can be viewed on CristalWeb at any time. A "snap-shot" of this data will be sent to parents on 22 February and this, alongside the results from the January modules (available electronically on 8 March), will form the basis for discussions at the Parents' Evenings (predominantly organised for parents of AS students) on 14 or 22 March.

### College Attendance and Illness

The vast majority of students attend regularly and on time - that is the College requirement. It is timely to point out that all references refer to attendance records and, given the demand for places at the College, those with a poor attendance will not necessarily be retained in College for a second year. Where attendance falls below 90%, the College Charter makes it clear that the student's place at the College will be put in jeopardy.

#### **Summer Examinations 2012**

#### Coursework Deadlines - all courses

Every year, some students find that they miss deadlines because they manage their time poorly. Please check with your son or daughter if deadlines are approaching planning ahead is very important!

Plagiarism - don't lend work; don't get disqualified A reminder to all students that coursework must be the work of the student alone. In the past, on occasions and often in panic, work has been copied from other candidates. This will always lead to disqualification from the examination. If a student lends work to another student "to help him out" or "because she is a good friend and she said she wouldn't copy it directly", it is likely that his or her entry will also be disqualified.

Never lend coursework or research notes to another student - and if there is a real difficulty, always consult your Subject Tutor over sharing of work.

When writing an extended essay, all references must be fully acknowledged. If students find helpful paragraphs in a book or on the Internet, they must not copy and paste it into their own essays in the pretence that they have written these passages. It is likely that the examiner will recognise it - and the work will then be disqualified.

This is an annual event to which parents and students are welcome. There will be an opportunity to talk to the Oxbridge representatives and ask questions.

### **University Admissions - Make sensible choices**

A record number of students have completed UCAS applications and are now receiving offers. Between May and June students will be required to accept firmly their first choice university, subject to their achieving the grades required; they can also hold an insurance offer. Each student is given an individual deadline date by UCAS. As a university education is now very expensive, it is even more important that students think carefully about their offers before they accept places. Students are advised to be realistic and only to accept a place for which they will be able to meet the requirements. We strongly recommend waiting for the results of the January modules before making final decisions. Once all decisions have been received via UCAS, students with more than one offer have to firmly accept one (known as **Conditional Firm - CF**) and identify another as their **Insurance** offer **(CI)**. If the student does not meet the CF offer but meets the CI offer, s/he will go to the **Insurance** place. **Students should choose their CI offer wisely - it should be lower than the CF choice.** Personal Tutors will be happy to discuss these matters with their tutees.

### Car parking around the College

Second year students driving to College have three possible parking places - The Brian Smith Car Park on site, the new on-road Student Bays, and Farnborough Football Club, each with different permits.

College policy states that parking is only available to first year students later in the year - we have just reached the point where they may apply for a temporary permit to use the Football Club. These students will be given first choice of permits in the second year, either on-road or on-site.

Students should not park their cars in any other places, particularly outside residential homes in more distant roads.

We are working with the local police to make sure that residents are not inconvenienced by students parking within the exclusion zone. This zone is on page 6 in the student diary.

Please do not use the College Car Parks to drop off or pick up students. An increase in car movements inevitably creates greater risks when pedestrian activity is at its height - it would be helpful to arrange a safe meeting place a little distance from the College.

The 5000 word essays are the culmination of five months of independent research carried out by students who volunteered to take on this work in addition to their A level studies.

This was Mrs Curnock Cook's second visit to the College and she told the audience of over 300 students and parents how delighted she was to return to such an impressive institution. She was astonished at the remarkable range of questions students had chosen to research ('If it looks right will it always fly right?', 'How effective would a fat tax be at reducing obesity?', 'Is laser fusion a viable energy source for the future?', 'Can money buy you happiness?'), and was so inspired that she wanted to take copies

away with her to read! Mrs Cumock Cook said that universities highly value the Extended Project as it demonstrates the ability of students to go beyond the confines of the A level syllabus and make connections between the subjects they are studying.

Simon Jarvis (Principal) congratulated the students on their achievement and commitment, remarking "You should be proud of your achievements, as I am."

### College celebrates success at Certificate Evening

The College Certificate Evening was held on Thursday 5 January: well over a thousand people were present in the Dame Kelly Holmes Centre to celebrate the success of 'the class of 2011' who left the College last summer.

The evening was a wonderful opportunity to recognise the achievements of a multitalented cohort. Joining former students and the Principal, Simon Jarvis, were parents, Personal Tutors who have overseen the journey from enrolment to 'graduation', teachers, Chair of Governors William Bagnall, and an array of special guests including the Chief Mark Dawe CEO, OCR and Madeleine Sakakini: Executive of OCR, Mark Dawe, who kindly presented the certificates.



Speaking to the largest gathering of its kind in the history of this event, Mark Dawe spoke of the significance of the students' achievements: 'Your successes stand comparison with those of any generation: let no one try to underestimate the scale and brilliance of your achievements.'

Last year, students recorded an A level pass rate of 97%; 25% passed at grades A\* or A and an impressive 51% achieved a grade B or above. 'You have been fortunate to have been able to study in a truly exceptional college. Farnborough has, justifiably, an outstanding reputation nationally', Mark told the former students.

### Students raise record amount for charity - A festive occasion as cheques presented



On the lunchtime of 15 December the Prospect Theatre was packed out for the annual Christmas Singalong with College students, pupils from St Bernadette's Catholic Primary School, and representatives from the Royal British Legion, Step By Step, the Army and the Police. They came to get in the festive spirit by singing carols and Christmas songs and to see the presentation of money raised by the students this year to various charities.

The student body led by the Student Association raised an incredible £13, 980 in just one term during Autumn 2011, more than they raised in the whole of the last academic year. The highlight of the Singalong event was the presentation

of a cheque for £8000 to Step by Step to support their work with homeless young people in the area. Each tutor group in College sponsored one of their tutor reps to sleep out for a night in November on the College site and collected as much as possible for Step by Step in an inter-tutor group competition to raise the most money. The £8000 raised is a really remarkable achievement and will make a real impact on the valuable work of Step by Step.

The Royal British Legion were also there to accept a cheque for £1000 which was raised by selling poppies at the world record attempt largest human poppy in November. The other money raised during the Autumn Term was in aid of Jeans for Genes, the Breast Cancer Campaign, Children In Need and Great Ormond Street Hospital.



Beanie Watson, the SA Charities Officer, gave her reaction to the term's fundraising, 'It is amazing to have raised so much and I really want to thank all those students who have done so much to make it happen. The Singalong was a wonderful end to an amazing term and the Student Association have now set their sights on raising much more for good causes in 2012'.
