CHOOSING YOUR COURSES

Before choosing your courses, it is important to understand your options.

WHAT WE OFFER

Here at the College, we offer both A level and vocational courses at level 3, which are equivalent to Key Stage 5.

A levels

These are general academic courses mainly assessed through examination at the end of two years.

Vocational

These are qualifications that are equivalent to A levels but are more vocationally oriented. Assessment varies by course and combines coursework, supervised assessment and examination.

A level and vocational courses are not mutually exclusive - they can be studied together. For example, you may choose to study two A level courses and a vocational course, or two vocational courses and one A level.

YOUR GCSE GRADES

Your GCSE grades will give a good indication of which courses are right for you. You will see from the 'Courses' pages on the College website that each subject has different entry requirements which are set to give you the best chance of success. All students are required to have at least a grade 4 in GCSE English language and maths.

You should have a good overall GCSE profile. By this we mean that the grades you achieve are more or less consistent across all the subjects you have taken at GCSE. Your Personal Tutor will give you advice on your course choices at interview and again at enrolment once you know your GCSE results.

YOUR TIMETABLE

Every student at the College has an individually tailored timetable. In addition to your chosen courses, your timetable will also include Tutorial and Prospects Diploma sessions, as well as any enrichment groups you participate in.

EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION (EPQ)

Stand out from the crowd - the EPQ is an independent research qualification, valued by universities and equivalent to half an A level. This is started in the summer term of your first year. You will be given more information about the EPQ closer to the time.

FAQS

Q Do you have large class sizes?

A Our class sizes are on average between 18 and 19, ideal for study at this level.

Q Is the College too big for me?

A It's true that this is a big college. HOWEVER you will be part of a small tutorial group and will quickly get to know other students studying the same subjects as you – remember all of you will be new to the College. With a big college, you benefit from a greater range of subjects and subject combinations, more facilities and teachers who specialise in 16-to-19 years education.

Q Will I know anybody?

A For those who join as the only student from your current school, we have special 'getting to know you' events so you can meet people in the same situation. Taking part in enrichment or joining a club or society are also great ways of making new friends who have the same interests as you!

Q Is Farnborough only for 'academic' students?

A We offer a wide range of courses including vocational subjects. These are assessed through coursework, supervised assessment and exams and are valued for further study, HE, apprenticeships and employment!

Q Does Farnborough have high entry requirements?

A There is no overall points score required to come to Farnborough and we will work with you to agree the courses you study. Our courses do require you to have certain GCSE grades, and this is because we want to give you the best chance of success. More information regarding course requirements can be found on our website, www.farnborough.ac.uk.

Q How will I manage my workload?

A As part of your timetable, you will be assigned study periods which we encourage you to use to complete your work. Our Learning Resource Centre has four areas across the College site where students can study independently or as a group, and there are also a number of social spaces that students can use to work.

Q Can I get food at College?

A There are several catering outlets on site which are dedicated to providing a variety of delicious meals, snacks and drinks - Time Out, Café Direct, Shades and The Greenhouse. The College also has its very own Starbucks! We operate a cashless catering system at Farnborough using Upay.



OUR RESULTS

2019 - ANOTHER BRILLIANT YEAR

Our students achieved an astonishing pass rate of 99.2% at A level. Almost a third of these were awarded at either A* or A and 85% of courses were graded at A* to C.

Our A level maths students achieved incredible results, with 409 of the 491 achieving A* to C - this is particularly impressive as our maths cohort is one of the largest 16-18 cohorts in the country!

The picture of success is similar for the vocational courses we offer. In 2019, 91.6% of students achieved high grades, a 10% increase from last year - an amazing achievement.

For the students taking our vocational health and social care course, a staggering 86 out of 90 students achieved the highest grade of Distinction*. Our vocational business students also achieved fantastic results, with 57 out of 63 students gaining a double Distinction*.

Students who have to retake GCSE English language and maths also achieve exceptional results with us.

The progress score, which compares our students' results to the actual achievements of other students with similar prior results, shows that students achieve far better results at Farnborough than they would have done at an average institution.

Our scores of 0.85 in English and 0.76 in maths mean almost all of our GCSE English language students achieved one grade higher with us, and in GCSE maths just over three quarters of our students achieved one grade higher!

A STEPPING STONE

After College, our students move on to a variety of destinations and enjoy success in their careers.

- 58.8%** Went on to HE with **28.1%** attending Russell Group universities
- 5.6%** Entered paid employment
- 3%** Carried on with studies in Further Education (FE)
- 2.7%** Took a gap year before starting university
- 1.7%** Took up an apprenticeship or traineeship

DEGREE CLASSIFICATION

The education landscape is changing and it is clear that HE is far from being the only option available to you. However, HE is still the most popular choice and more of our students achieve first/upper second class degrees than those students who attended all other types of schools (state or privately funded) and other sixth form colleges.

For those Farnborough students who went on to Russell Group universities, a staggering 92.9% of them achieved a first/upper second class degree!

Farnborough is an outstanding choice for post-16 study; by any measure, our students flourish here and fulfil their potential, as they have done for many years.

WE ADD VALUE

Whilst our results are impressive, you need to take a deeper look to really understand how well all of the students who choose Farnborough do in their studies.

VALUE ADDED

Value Added (VA) is a measurement used to analyse a student's progress from their achievement at GCSE to their final grades.

The VA figures show that 1,076 out of 4,830 A levels were graded one grade higher when taken at the College than if they had been taken at a college or school sixth form achieving the national average. For vocational qualifications, this figure is 123 out of 212.

Another way of looking at this is to say that students in average colleges who are working at the top of a grade would have achieved the next grade higher at Farnborough - for example, a student in another college working at a B+, would have achieved an A if they had come to us.

For vocational subjects, this would mean a student in another college working at a high Distinction* if they had studied at Farnborough.

Simply put, students who choose Farnborough for their studies achieve better results than those who attend any other colleges in Hampshire, Berkshire or Surrey.

Compared with schools and colleges across the country, our A level and vocational students have achieved results over the past three years that put them in the top 10% - an outstanding achievement!

All students with a strong GCSE profile will become a member of the 'Aspire' programme when they enrol at the College. Knowing and understanding all of the options for your next steps after college is immensely important. Whilst the vast majority of our students go on to HE, increasing numbers choose an apprenticeship or employment-based training following their studies – there are lots of options.

OUTSTANDING ADVICE

The 'Prospects' team are here to help you make informed choices about your future. They have been awarded the national Quality in Careers Standard, recognising their commitment to provide impartial, independent careers education, information, advice and guidance. The College fulfils all the Gatsby Benchmarks, a framework that defines what makes the best careers provision in schools and colleges.

CAREERS INFORMATION AND GUIDANCE

All students are encouraged to book a 1-to-1 appointment with one of our professional careers advisors to explore the opportunities available to them.

We also hold two major careers events at the College each year: the Training, Employment and Apprenticeship Fair and Moving On Day. These offer opportunities for students to speak directly to hundreds of universities, employers, training providers and global corporate businesses.

Throughout the year, expert speakers from academia and industry are also invited into College to share information about the different progression pathways in their field.

THE PROSPECTS DIPLOMA

It is clear that employability skills are an essential part of the toolkit you will need whatever you choose to do in the future. At Farnborough, all students complete the Prospects Diploma over two years which helps them to collate and evidence their own workplace experience and skills. Students build a 'professional profile' which they can use to put together a CV and take with them when they leave College.

The Diploma, which is compulsory, forms an essential part of the Tutorial programme and was designed in collaboration with employers, training providers and HE institutions to ensure that it meets the needs of future employers and education establishments.

ESSENTIAL WORKPLACE SKILLS

Whether you carry on in education or enter the world of work, it is highly likely that you will be asked about your essential workplace skills – skills such as resilience, effective communication and problem solving. The College has links to local, national and international employers across a range of sectors and can help you identify relevant placement and volunteering possibilities. Having this experience really will give you the edge, and is a key component of The Prospects Diploma.

Recent trips to support the curriculum have seen students travelling to a variety of destinations, including Berlin, New York, Paris and Valencia. Students also go to see West End shows, visit world-famous museums and attend conferences with renowned speakers.

We work closely with Outlook Expeditions to offer exciting overseas trips to students: these have included Costa Rica, Mongolia, Morocco and Vietnam. There is also a chance for students to visit our partner school, The Presbyterian Secondary Technical School, in Aburi, Ghana.

The College supports independent travel abroad and gives students the opportunity to apply for a Travel Scholarship. Past scholarships have supported a fantastic and varied range of projects including:

The College competes in football, rugby, netball, hockey, badminton, basketball and cricket at county, regional and national levels. There are also opportunities to represent the College in swimming, tennis and cross country.

There are 15 sports teams that play weekly in the winter terms and we have over 300 students who represent the College on a weekly basis in the Hampshire leagues.

Training is added to a student's timetable and teams are coached by experts to ensure each player has the opportunity to reach their full sporting potential. Students compete against top teams from across the country and achieve much success. We've even had former students who have gone on to compete at the Olympics!

We also support the many students who compete at international level in a multitude of sports and help them to juggle demanding training schedules with their studies.

Recent highlights include:

- the **badminton team** qualifying for the finals of the Association of Colleges' (AoC) National Cup.
- the **men's hockey team** reaching the finals of the AoC National Cup and the **mixed hockey team** getting to the semi-finals.
- **20 of our students** representing in golf, badminton, cross country, tennis and basketball at the AoC National Sports Finals as part of the South East team. Every student medalled in their sport, with our **women's basketball team** winning overall!
- the **women's basketball team** qualifying to represent the South East at the AoC National Finals to defend their national title.
- the **men's football team** getting to the semi-finals of the English Schools' Football Association U18 National Cup.
- the **swimming team** reaching the Relay National Finals representing in both freestyle and medley.

PERFORMING ARTS

Our performing arts facilities incorporate the modern, purpose-built Prospect Theatre and teaching suites for dance and drama which will enable you to study and perform in superb and inspiring surroundings.

The following enrichment activities are open to all students who have an interest in performing arts:

PROSPECT THEATRE COMPANY

This is the College's dedicated theatre company that all students are eligible to audition for. The company visit local schools to deliver masterclasses, take part in workshops, see shows and perform in the Prospect Theatre.

LAMDA SHORT COURSES

The London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art is a world leading conservatoire and awarding organisation. Students can undertake LAMDA's nationally recognised qualifications in acting and musical theatre at the College. They are asked to prepare audition speeches and songs for a visiting examiner.

MUSICAL THEATRE ENRICHMENT

This group works towards an annual Christmas production and continues through the year with smaller performances. All shows encompass the disciplines of acting, singing and dancing, catering to everyone from first time performers to those who are already experienced on the stage.

FLEXI-CREW

The flexi-crew create and operate the various technical aspects of performances. Without their help, productions would not be able to take place. If lighting, sound, stage management, set or costume design are your thing then this is the place to be!

Recent performances from all these groups have included Bye Bye Birdie, Mary Poppins, The House of Bernada Alba, Around the World in 80 Days, Scuttlers and The Wolves of Willoughby Chase.



MUSIC

Our music and music technology departments are some of the most renowned and versatile in the country, providing outstanding musical tuition and enrichment to students.

The departments offer extensive performance opportunities to all musicians covering a wide range of musical styles. From grand choral projects, pop, rock and jazz concerts to intimate recitals and small ensemble performances, students are able to fully develop their passion for music.

Our students have performed in some of Europe's foremost venues, including Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral, St. Mark's Basilica in Venice and Nikolaikirche, Leipzig. Students also enjoy unparalleled industry experience, such as performing, recording and mixing at the world-famous Abbey Road Studios in London.

The College recognises the huge benefit that music has within the community. Students perform in local venues such as schools, hospitals and hospices and lead masterclasses to inspire the next generation of musicians.

The department boasts world-class facilities including a fully equipped purpose-built recording studio, 60 iMac computers running Logic Pro X and NI Komplete Ultimate, 2 mixing suites, a band performance room, a 300 seat theatre, a recital room, 4 grand pianos (including a Bösendorfer), 12 fully-equipped practice rooms, 3 bespoke contemporary music rehearsal spaces and 20 MacBook Pro computers.



CREATIVE ARTS

For those who have a passion for the creative arts, there are numerous opportunities to enhance your skills, be inspired and prepare for a successful career in the industry. We offer students the unique opportunity to work on project briefs given by real clients across the creative disciplines.

We have an in-house production team, 'F6 Productions', who create media products for local clients, an invaluable experience which helps to prepare students for life after college in this incredibly competitive sector. 'F6 Productions' have made promotional videos for local companies and organisations, including Hydrolife, Makaton and Happiful Magazine.

Photography students often provide the photography for local charity and community events, enabling them to build up a portfolio of work to present to universities and employers. Their work is also displayed in venues across the local area.

Our graphic design students regularly attend workshops and talks from well-known illustrators and designers, as well as former College students who have progressed into a graphic design career or a creative course at university.

In 2019, the College held its inaugural 'Creative Kickstart' event, three weeks of talks and presentations delivered by specialist speakers, giving students a direct insight into the range of job roles and progression routes within the areas of graphic design, film, media, architecture, journalism and photography. In the summer, the creative arts departments come together for the annual Art Exhibition and Fashion Show which showcases and celebrates the amazing work that students have produced.

STUDENT ASSOCIATION

The College strongly values the views of all its students and it is important for them to have an active role in developing how the College is run. Every student is part of the Student Association (SA).

Each year, an SA Committee is elected to represent the views of our 3,900 strong student body. This way of engaging with the students to make Farnborough 'student-led' has a long and successful history.

As well as organising events, such as Freshers' Week, RAG Week and the Leavers' Ball, the SA Committee ensures that feedback is collated from across the cohort to help facilitate real change for students. The Committee's President and Vice President sit on the College's Academy Quality Council which works closely with the Senior Leadership Team to shape the future of the College.

Details about applying for the SA Committee are shared with students during their first year.

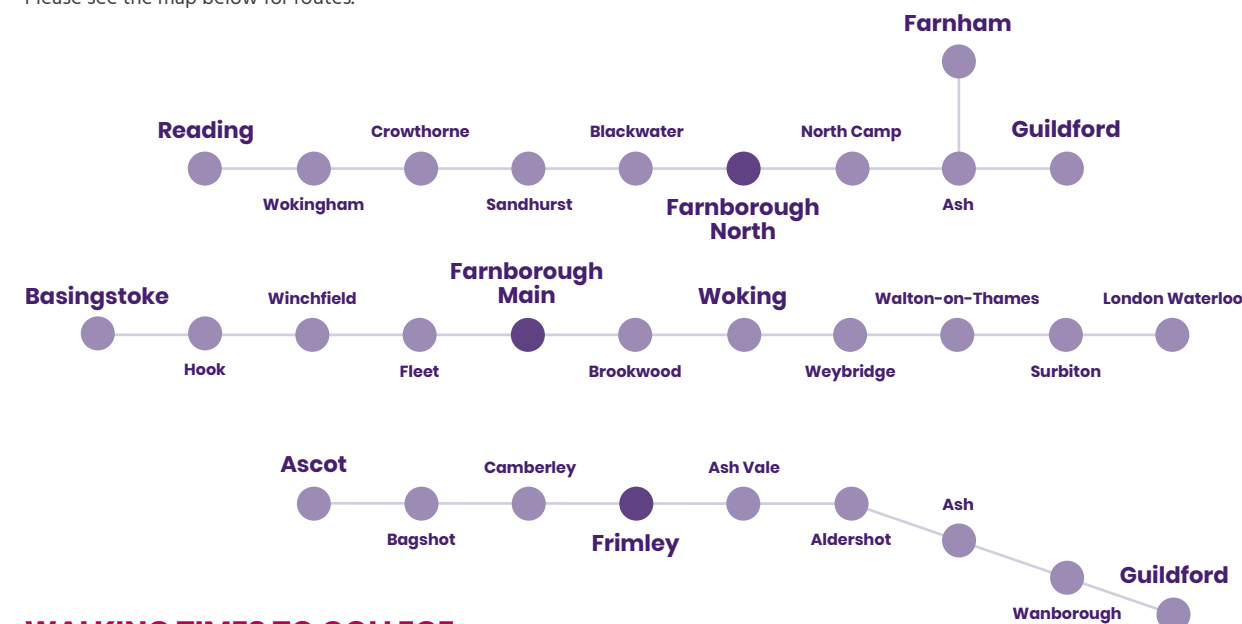


YOUR JOURNEY
